

## Warm-up

## Teaching Tip

### For Exercise 4

### Not the Only Game in Town

Hey, **cinephiles**, we're back for another blog on the world of film. While many cinematic styles bring their flavor to their movies, these two industries dominate the international film scene. So today, we'll consider the differences between them. First, our question is: Are you Team Hollywood or Team Bollywood? If unsure, here are some key distinguishing factors between these amazing and extremely **lucrative** filmmaking empires.

Let's start with that **omnipresent** cinematic power, Hollywood. What characterizes Hollywood movies? Look for fast-paced stories, lots of action, and impressive special effects. Hollywood movies, such as *Mission: Impossible* (1996-2025), *Predator* (1987-2025), *Alien* (1979-2024) series, can be recognized by their big-budget blockbusters. Hollywood movies feature superheroes, including comic book heroes like Superman and Batman, and 'universes' like *Marvel*, *Star Wars*, and *Star Trek*. The stars of Hollywood cinematic offerings are internationally known, and Hollywood has an extensive **range** of genres: rom-com, sci-fi, and action. There's a genre for every taste.

On the other hand, Bollywood films are energetic **fantasies** filled with music, dance, and emotions—there's dancing in the streets, dramatic love stories, and incredible soundtracks. They blend Indian tradition with modern themes and tend to be longer, more dramatic, more **emotional** than Hollywood films, and more musical than Hollywood musicals. Some examples of these clearly defined style elements include *RRR* (2022), *3 Idiots* (2017), *Dangal* (2016).

Whether you're Team Hollywood or Team Bollywood, I invite you to watch films from the **rival** team. This may open the door to movies from around the world, like Korean or Chinese ones. There's a whole world out there!



## Language Structures and Functions Tip

### For Exercise 6

First, remind students that homophones are words that sound the same, but look different and have different meanings. Then, elicit examples to ensure students understand the difference between homophones and homonyms. Finally, if time allows and you deem necessary, review the grammar point in more detail.

## Teaching Tip
